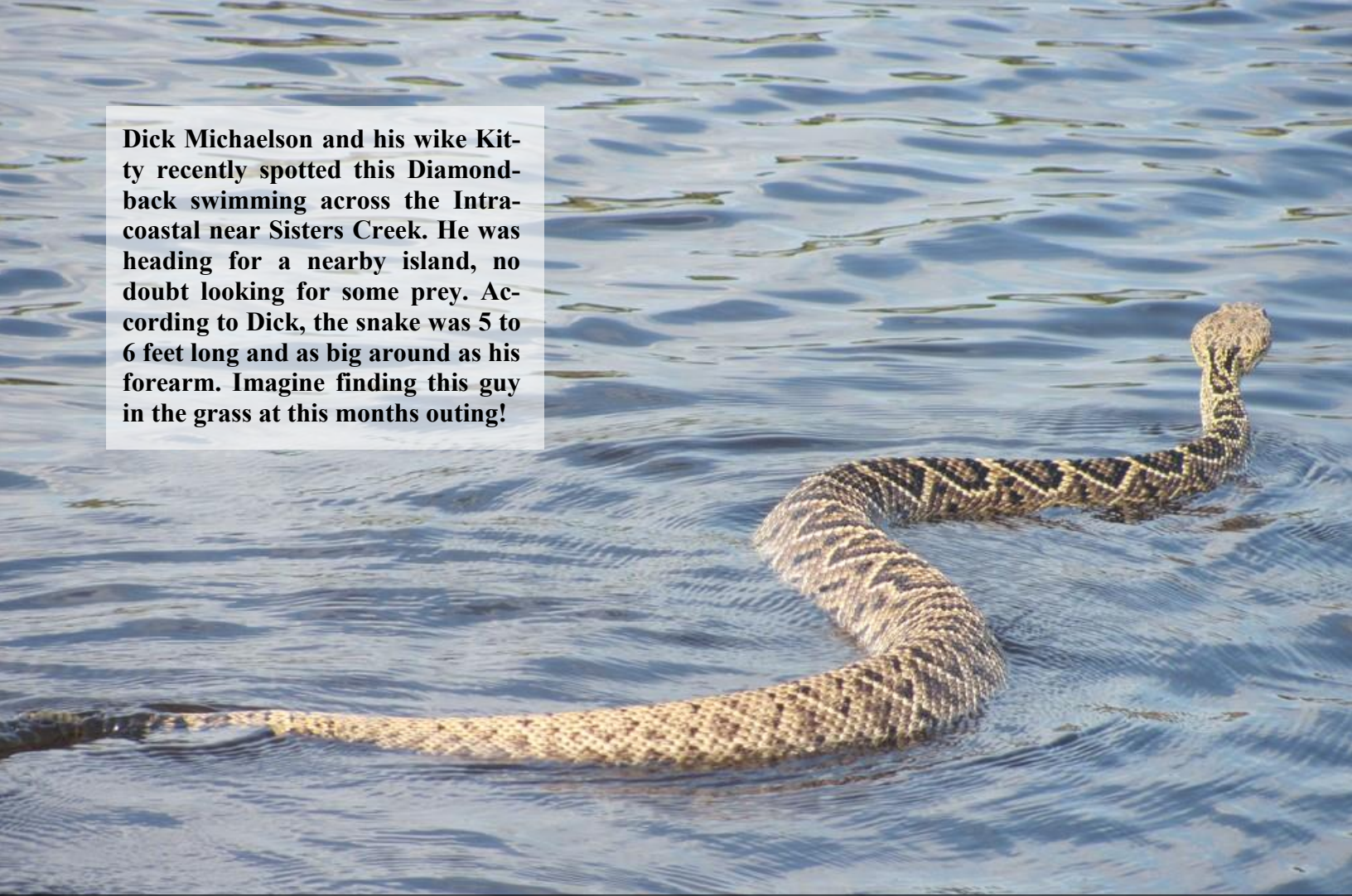
Online registration will open on **August 3 and close on September 27**.

The Big Gun distance competition is an individual event for those who make a 100' or longer cast in the distance portion of the main event.

The competition is free and trophies will be awarded for the top three teams and the Big Gun champion. Bagels, doughnuts and coffee will be available in the morning and sandwiches, drinks and chips will be served at the end of the main event (cutoff time - 12:00pm). The Big Gun event follows afterward.

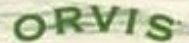

The Fly Fishing Museum of the Southern Appalachians

Cherokee North Carolina's newest attraction – the Fly Fishing Museum of the Southern Appalachians – is now open. Through exhibits and videos visitors will learn about past fly fishing legends, the evolution of rods and reels, basic knots, fly-tying, types of gear, types of gamefish, regional fishing waters, and the history of fly fishing in the Southeast.

The museum is open daily (off-season schedule may vary). The website, FlyFishingMuseum.org, has hours of operation, directions, and exhibit information, as well as membership and donation opportunities.

The museum is the recipient of start-up grants from the Cherokee Preservation Foundation and tremendous support from the Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indians. Two other large donations include a grant for the Tailrace Exhibit from Tennessee Valley Authority, and a \$20,000 donation by Southern Trout Magazine.

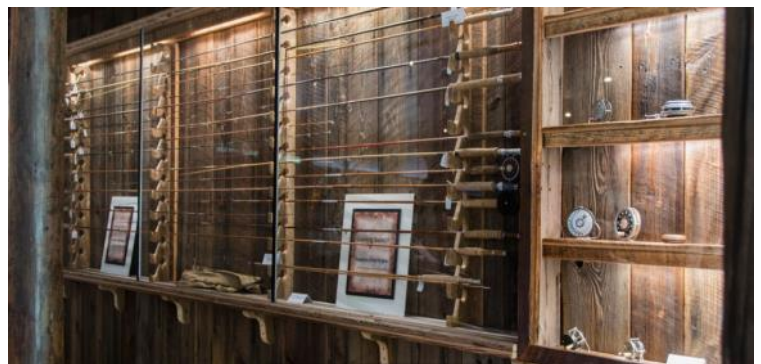
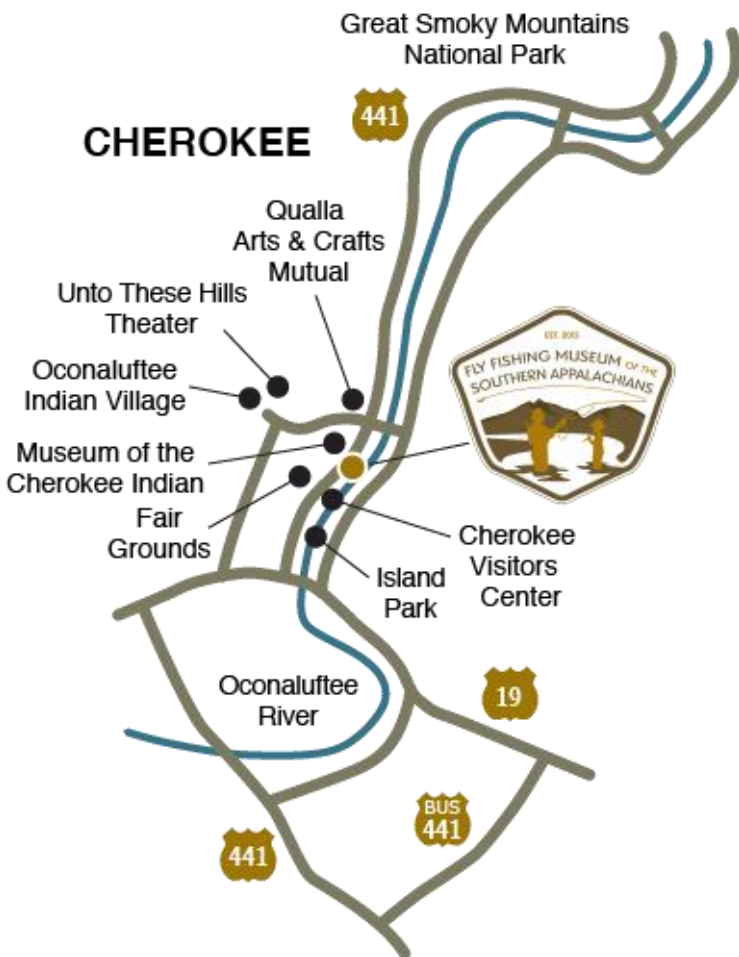


“We’re pleased that [Southern Trout](#) has been so generous in its support of the museum,” says curator Alen Baker. “The donation is largely in the form of advertising, which is great for the museum as the magazine is well-read by fly fishermen.”

The museum is centrally located in Cherokee – next door to the Visitor Center, and across from the Fairgrounds and the Museum of the Cherokee Indian. The back deck of the museum building overlooks the Oconaluftee River; and the Museum is within walking distance of Oconaluftee Islands Park.

Cherokee is the home of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians and some of Western North Carolina’s most acclaimed trout waters. Adjacent to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Cherokee is 1 hour west of Asheville, 2 hours from Knoxville, Greenville/Spartanburg & Chattanooga, and 3 hours from Charlotte, Winston-Salem and Atlanta.

The museum is also home to the Cherokee NC Chamber of Commerce & Area Information Center as well as a Gift Shop with Cherokee and museum logoed jackets, t-shirt hoodies, caps, umbrellas, camp fire mugs, waterproof maps, water bottles, waterproof holders, fishing maps, locally-roasted special blend coffee, and much more.

While this isn't a rod for beginner fly casters, it is friendly to intermediate casters as well as experts and performs in a wide range of conditions.

The industry praise for this rod is phenomenal. But lets face it, the **real reason you want this rod is because it is Bill Lott's. It has some serious fish catching mojo!**

This Month's Outing - Saturday October 31, 2015

Cedar Point Flood Tide



Halloween will likely be your last time to fish for reds in the grass this year. A 5.87' high tide is scheduled for 12:27 PM. If you haven't noticed, the secret is out about fishing for reds in the grass. Nowadays, the grass flats are lousy with fisherman. And a good number of them are lousy fisherman. Plan to be on the water at least an hour before high tide, if not earlier, so you can claim your patch of grass.

For this outing you will need a sturdy pair of wading shoes, an 8 or 9 weight rod and crab flies. Several patterns are productive for reds in the grass including: Larry Miniard's Fidler in the Grass, John Bottko's Turkey in the Grass, Dupree Spoons and the OCTOGO. If you need to stock-up on flies, tippetts or leaders be sure and visit either Blackfly Outfitters or Saltwater Fly Tyers. Both shops have a great selection of flood tide accoutrements.

We will be having one last post-flood tide BBQ at the boat ramp after the tide. If you can't make the meeting, or want more information about the outing please email

A email will be sent out the week before the outing so we can gage interest, make sure boat-less members are paired up with boats, and to get a head count for the BBQ.
