Fly Rodding the First Coast
Capt. John Bottko

This month we have the pleasure of welcoming a charter member of the First Coast Fly Fishers back to the Club. Captain John Bottko has been a mainstay of the First Coast fly fishing community for over 25 years. John and several other local fly fishermen started the First Coast Fly Fishers over 20 years ago. For over 15 years John was the proprietor of The Salty Feather, one of the longest running fly shops in Jacksonville. Nowadays, John spends his time working and guiding out of Blackfly Outfitters.



Without question, John is one of the most knowledgeable fly fishing guides in northeast Florida. He helped to pioneer fishing for redfish in the spartina grass during the annual flood tides. John has created numerous salter fly patters, five of which appear in the book *Flies for Saltwater*. He was also one of the fly tiers featured in A.J.McClane's *New Standard Fishing Encyclopedia CD*. His fly the *Surfin' Woolly* is the go-to fly for catching redfish in the surf.

John has taught fly fishing at Jacksonville University and he holds an Certified Casting Instructor certificate from Fly Fishers International (formerly International Federation of Fly Fishers). John is a very experienced travel host and has been hosting exotic fly fishing trips around the world: Argentina, Chili, Russia, Amazon, Venezuela, Baha-mas, Scotland, Mexico, Central America, Alaska and Canada. In the summer of 2012 he guided in Alaska for three and half months. Since closing The Salty Feather a couple of years ago, John has kept busy guiding and hosting trips to some of the best fly fishing destinations around the world. On Saturday mornings, John co-hosts the *Florida Sportsman's Radio Program* from 7 to 9 am on WFXJ 930 AM.

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IFF Changes Name to Fly Fishers International

For most of us, fly fishing is more than just a sport. It's been central to our lives in many ways, providing a much-needed break from the daily grind, and giving us time on the water we'll never forget, as well as friendships that will last a lifetime. That's why I'm especially excited to announce that our organization is undergoing a significant evolution that I believe will better reflect the importance fly fishing plays in all our lives. The new name of our organization is Fly Fishers International (FFI), and with it comes a reinvigorated approach to our programs, mission, and purpose.

As president of FFI (formerly known as the International Federation of Fly Fishers, or IFFF), I wanted to give you a little background into this change, which is a tremendously exciting new chapter in our group's storied history, and for the future of the sport.

Our core values remain unchanged—to continue to serve as a strong advocate for fly fishing in all waters for all fish, to preserve and promote the arts of fly casting and fly tying, and to help ensure that future generations can enjoy these same one-of-a-kind experiences.

So why the change?

Change can be difficult, and we want you all to know that the process leading up to this evolution involved hundreds if not thousands of hours of in-depth discussions and thoughtful debate among board members and dedicated volunteers.

Rebranding and a potential name change was originally identified for consideration by the Strategic Planning Committee when it first met in May of 2015. Why was it being discussed? Certainly, one key issue revolved around the name: based on research, fly anglers do not find the name "International Federation of Fly Fishers" appealing, nor did it sound like a modern organization. Looking at the average age of IFFF membership, organizational goals for growth, and a perceived lack of relevance among some fly fishing groups, we knew it was time to ask some hard questions.

The process of exploring potential rebranding began with the hiring of a marketing and branding agency, which was tasked with evaluating current recognition of the organization within the fly fishing community, and to document and analyze the thoughts and opinions of our members regarding our current brand presence.

Early on, questionnaires were sent to three sample populations: the general fly fishing community, current IFFF members, and members who had allowed their IFFF membership to lapse. Although the three sample populations were diverse in terms of their demographics and relationship to the Federation (members versus non-members), their comments were consistent. One of the most jarring results was that up to 88% of non-member fly anglers had never even heard of the International Federation of Fly Fishers (and we've been around since 1964). Another result made it clear that, while our core mission was still very relevant, there was a disconnect between what we

do in the context of our mission, and what people think we do.

Overall, the survey results were quite clear: our organization needs to do a much better job of informing both members and the general public of what we do, and why that mission is critical to ensuring our opportunity to fly fish doesn't vanish. From protecting public access to passing on the art of fly tying, or teaching two-handed casting to addressing overcrowding and habitat degradation, there is a clear need for the voice of the fly fisher to be heard.

Therefore, leadership agreed a name change was central to this rebranding—and to signal, in no uncertain terms, a fundamental evolution was underway. Through further research and discussion, Fly Fishers International was recommended as the strongest name choice. The name incorporates elements of our current name, but is reconceived in a simple, straightforward way that emphasizes our primary market target—people who fly fish—while embracing the international presence that we continue to nurture and expand.

Finally, Fly Fishers International is also already echoed in the name of our organization's long-time publication, Flyfisher Magazine, offering another level of recognition among our current members, corporate partners, and the fly fishing community as a whole.

As many of you have rightly pointed out, organizational change will not simply occur with the change of our name. A great deal of hard work lies ahead. We recognize the need to do a much better job of increasing public awareness for the great work our organization continues to accomplish, and for taking better advantage of the partnerships, potential projects, and other opportunities that could benefit from FFI's help in making positive impacts.

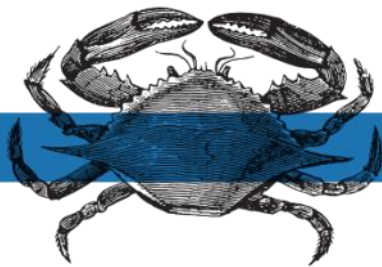
But these efforts won't be nearly as effective without your help. Please join Fly Fishers International as we work together to cultivate conservation, education, and community within the sport of fly fishing.

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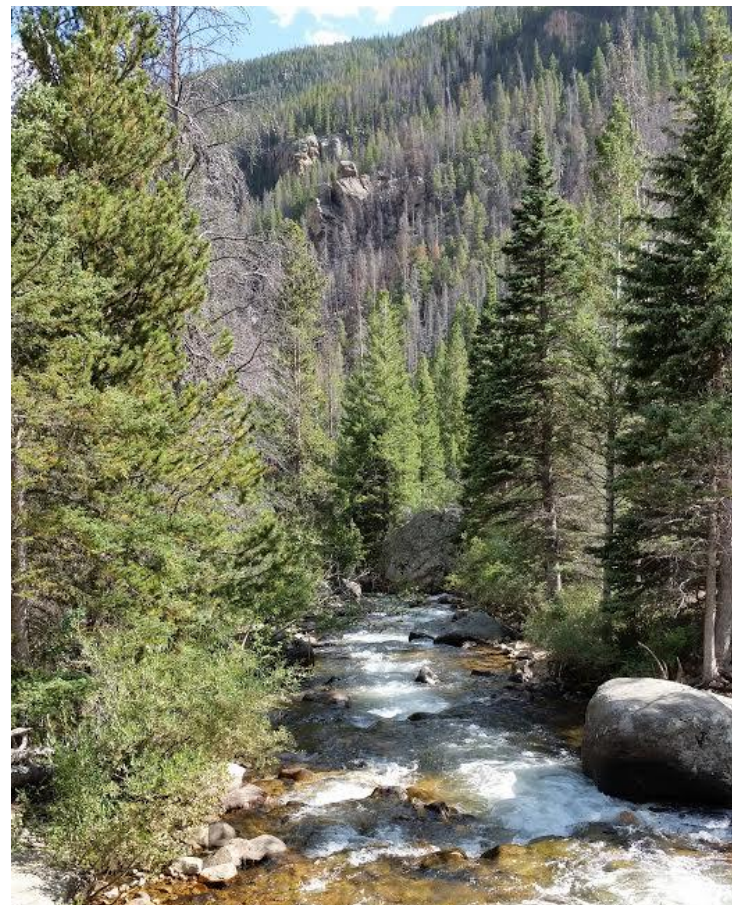

Center Focus on Washington Brings Anglers and Boaters to the Hill

Washington, D.C. (May 17, 2017) – The Center for Sportfishing Policy hosted its annual fly-in “Center Focus on Washington,” where recreational anglers and boaters participated in critical discussions with key policymakers over the two-day meeting held May 15-16. As in years past, the Center co-located its fly-in with the American Boating Congress (ABC) hosted by the National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA).

Key issues for ABC and Center Focus participants: Passing the Modern Fish Act to fix the Magnuson-Stevens Act; Ensuring robust public access to federally managed waters; Reforming the Renewable Fuel Standard; Solving the Gulf red snapper catastrophe; and many others. These matters were discussed during the course of the fly-in with top administration and Capitol Hill officials, including representatives from the Department of Commerce and the House Natural Resources Committee, among others.

“Members of the Center for Sportfishing Policy and the National Marine Manufacturers Association are among the most effective advocates in the recreational fishing and boating industry,” said Jeff Angers, President of the Center for Sportfishing Policy. “Recreational boating and fishing are key drivers in the \$887 billion outdoor recreation economy, and we look forward to working with the Administration and policymakers to ensure continued growth and better public access to our nation’s natural marine resources.”

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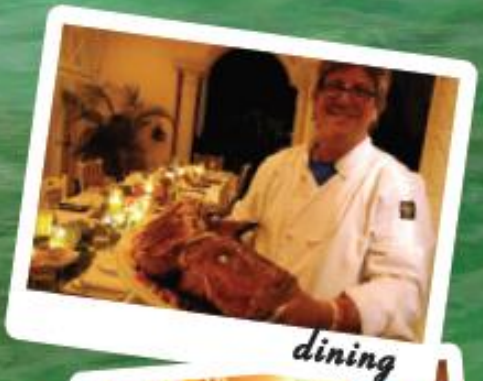

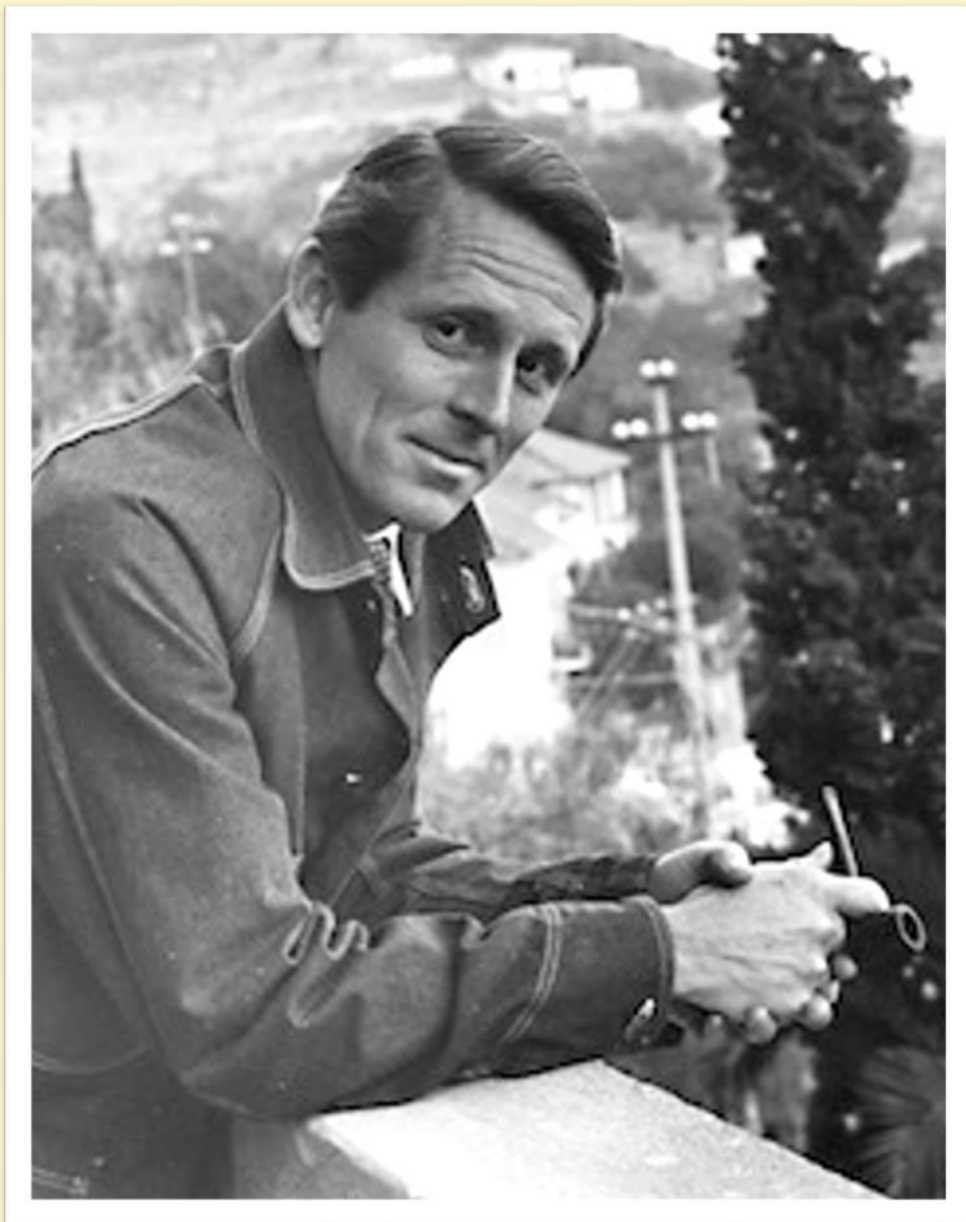

Pfeiffer has served as Chairman of the Board for the American Sportfishing Association. He is a founding board member and vice chairman of the Coastal Conservation Association of California. He’s a founding board member of the Jose Wejbe Spanish Fly Memorial Foundation.

The Eddie Smith Manufacturer of the Year award was established by the Center to honor extraordinary commitment to conservation by manufacturers. An icon in marine manufacturing, Smith served on NMMA’s board; the International Game Fish Association board; the Congressional Sportsmen’s Foundation board, and many other leadership roles. Well known as the owner of Grady White Boats, Smith received the first-ever ASA Lifetime Achievement Award and is a member of the NMMA Hall of Fame.

Past recipients of the award include AFTCO’s Bill Shedd; Bass Pro Shops’ Johnny Morris; Grady White Boats’ Kris Carroll; Maverick Boats’ Scott Deal, and Yamaha’s Phil Dyskow.

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This Month's Outing....

The St. Johns River

This month on **June 24th** the Club will be fishing the St. Johns River for bass, bream, bowfin and hybrid striped bass. Gavin Glover's Grandfather is allowing the Club to use his home on the river as our base of operations for this month's outing. His house is located at 111 Williams Park Road in Green Cove Springs. At the house there is plenty of room to park and lots of dock space to tie up boats. This promises to be a great outing.

Boats

Members with canoes and kayaks can launch their crafts at the house. There is a Clay County's [Williams Road boat ramp](#) is located about 1/2-mile south of the house. Small boats can be launched from this ramp. Much of the river in front of the house is wadeable. So if you do not have a boat you can wade fish from shore.

Flies and Equipment

Five, six and seven weight rods with floating lines will be ideal for this outing. However, 8 and 9-weight rods will also be effective, especially for casting large wind-resistant streamers and top water flies. If you have multiple rods at your disposal, plan to bring at least two rods, rig one with a streamer and the other with a top water flie.

According to Gavin, the fishing has been very good lately throughout the day. Concentrate on working the grass beds and docks. Grass shrimp imitations work best for bluegills and bream. Use large streamers and topwater flies for bass. Lately, the best color combinations for bass have been black with gold flash, olive, or white.

Weed guards are a must. You will be fishing in areas with a lot of grass. So to avoid frustration and missed strikes, make sure you have seed guards.

Tying Night

Gavin will be hosting a tying night on **June 21st** at 210 Self Storage (10030 EW Pappy Road, St Johns, FL). He will be tying several patterns that will be ideal for this outing.

Lunch

We will be serving lunch around 12 or 1 pm Saturday afternoon. Plan to bring your family, a covered dish and law chairs with you to the lunch. The Club will be providing the entree and drinks. Regardless of whether or not you fish, plan to join us for lunch Saturday afternoon.

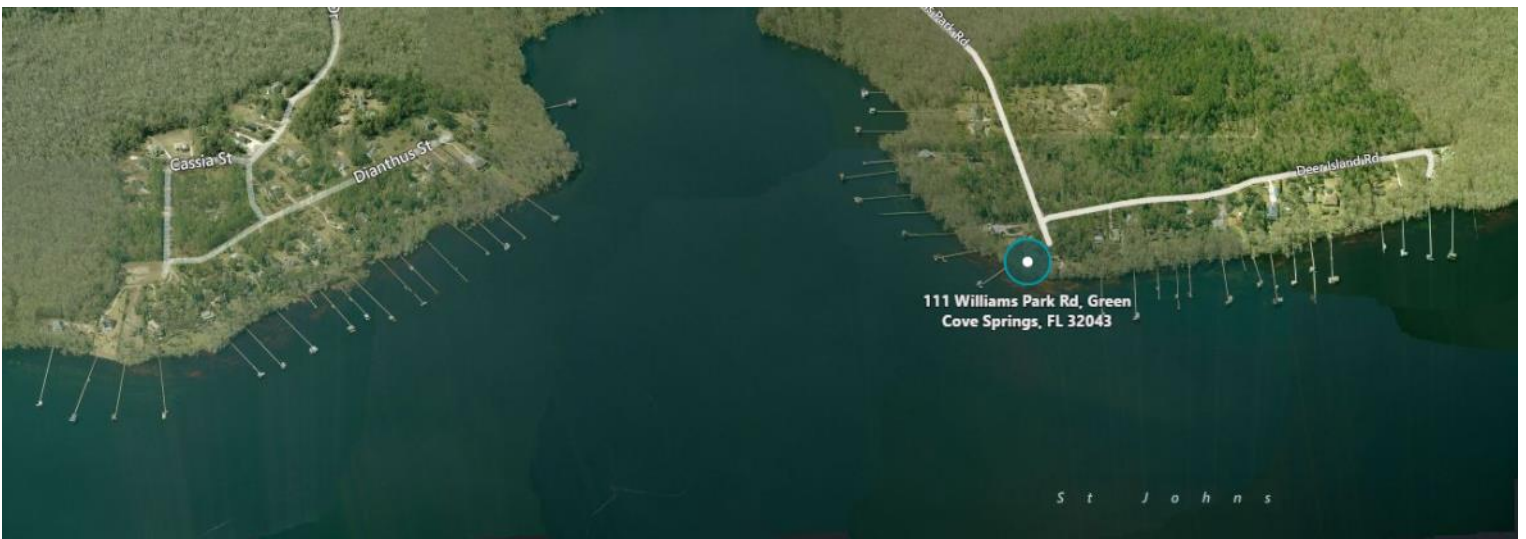

Largemouth Bass: *Micropterus salmoides*

Appearance:

The largemouth bass is the best known and most popular game fish in North America. It is distinguished from other black bass because the upper jaw extends beyond the rear edge of the eye, and the first and second dorsal (back) fins are separated by an obvious deep dip.

Habitat:

The Florida largemouth bass is the state freshwater fish. Found statewide in lakes and rivers, they are commonly found along vegetation, or underwater structure, but schooling bass are also found in the middle of lakes.

Behavior:

Black bass spawn in spring, when males fan out a bed and then protect the eggs and fry. The baby fish eat zooplankton (microscopic animals that drift in the water column), and when about an inch long begin eating other small fish. Adults eat a wide variety of fish, crustaceans and larger insects.

Additional Information

State Record: 17.27 lbs. (Note several larger fish have been documented but not certified.) Participate in [TrophyCatch](#), FWC's citizen-science program that rewards anglers for documenting and releasing trophy bass 8 lbs or larger!

[Big Catch](#) minimum: 24 inches or 8.0 lbs.

Fishing Tips and Facts: Florida is an outstanding destination to catch a trophy. A photo and measurements of your fish can be converted into lifelike fiberglass mounts, so you can release the lunker to fight another day. The best live bait is a golden shiner, fished under a float or free-lined. Typically, the shiner is hooked through the lips or back with a large hook, 2/0 to 5/0. A medium to medium-heavy rod with 14- to 20-pound test line is preferred, particularly when fishing in areas with thick vegetation or cover. Plastic worms are the most dependable artificial bait for largemouth bass. A weedless Texas- or Carolina-rigged worm is especially effective with heavy plant cover. Checking "Florida Fishing Weekly" is a great way to learn about the full array of techniques available to bass anglers as well as specific details about different bass fisheries around the state.
