IGFA Inducts New Members into Fishing Hall of Fame



Dania Beach, Fla. – Nov. 1, 2017 – The International Game Fish Association (IGFA) Fishing Hall of Fame Class of 2017 was honored on Sat., Oct. 28, in a ceremony held at the new IGFA Fishing Hall of Fame located in Johnny Morris' Wonders of Wildlife National Museum & Aquarium in Springfield, Mo. The 2017 inductees include Rick Clunn, Larry Dahlberg, Peter Fithian, Mike Levitt, and Dr. Eric Prince. These five anglers join 116 fishing greats in the IGFA Fishing Hall of Fame and were recognized for their extraordinary achievements in recreational fishing around the world.

The 19th annual IGFA Fishing Hall of Fame ceremony featured remarks from IGFA Chairman Charles W. Duncan III, IGFA President Nehl Horton and Bass Pro Shops Founder and CEO Johnny Morris, who is also an IGFA Trustee Emeritus and a member of the IGFA Fishing Hall of Fame. IGFA Trustee Andy Mill served as Master of Ceremonies as the Class of 2017 inductees shared their appreciation and passion for recreational angling with those in attendance.

The 2017 IGFA Fishing Hall of Fame honorees were recognized for their contributions to the sport fishing community and are highlighted below.

Rick Clunn is a four-time Bassmaster Classic winner (one of only two anglers to achieve the honor) and is a member of the Bass Fishing Hall of Fame. When he's not fishing, Clunn shares his love of the sport with children in schools across America. He is recognized by the IG-



FA Fishing Hall of Fame for his endless enthusiasm for the sport of bass fishing, his unmatched four decades of winning B.A.S.S. events and his amazing bass fishing prowess.

Larry Dahlberg has fished for more than 50 years in 80 countries and is the host of The Hunt for Big Fish.

He created the unique "Dahlberg Diver" fly and is responsible for many other fishing innovations. He's received the Henshall Award by the Federation of Fly Fishers, is a member of the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame and was the recipient of the 1999 IGFA Conservation Award.



Dahlberg is recognized for his lifetime of fishing innovations, his awarding winning television career and his conservation efforts.

Peter Fithian is best known as the founder of the Hawaiian International Billfish Tournament (HIBT), the "Grandfather" of all billfish fishing tournaments. With more than 50 years of rich history, the HIBT is one of the longest running tournaments of all time and the birthplace of countless



innovations in angling tactics, tournament management and billfish conservation. Fithian also founded the Pacific Ocean Research Foundation (PORF) to learn more about Pacific blue marlin, and was instrumental in the foundation of the Japan Game Fish Association (JGFA). Fithian is recognized by the IGFA for his lifelong commitment to improve the tournament sport fishing experience and for his efforts in the conservation of game fish across the globe.

Mike Levitt developed a passion for light tackle angling in the 1960s, which led him to the IG-FA. He has held 16 world records, including light tackle records for black and white marlin. A former Chairman of the IGFA, Levitt spearheaded efforts to build the IGFA Headquarters in



Dania Beach, Fla. Levitt led the design and financing of

a succession of custom sport fishing boats, which helped to develop the prototype for the large sport fishing boats widely used today. The IGFA recognizes Levitt for his angling achievements, charitable acts and innovations in sport fishing.

Dr. Eric Prince is considered one of the world's top fisheries scientists, and is an angler, researcher and proponent for the sport of fishing. He's had an illustrious 35-year career as a billfish biologist with the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) and his research, pri-



marily on billfish, has been published over 100 times. Dr. Prince has been a driving force in the Adopt a Billfish satellite tagging program and a leading researcher and proponent of the use of circle hooks. He's served conservation through his research and helping to create The Billfish Foundation, which earned him the IGFA Conservation Award in 2016. Prince is recognized by the IGFA for his extensive research on important recreational species to ensure their sustainable management and a lifetime of fishing.

FWC Endorses National Strategy Aimed at Conserving Fish, Wildlife

he Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) in July endorsed an ambitious national strategy, presented by <u>The Blue</u> <u>Ribbon Panel on Sustaining America's</u> <u>Diverse Fish and Wildlife Resources</u>, to conserve fish and wildlife, keep thousands of U.S. species from becoming endangered, and leave a legacy of healthy wildlife populations for future generations.

The Recovering America's Wildlife Act, introduced on Dec. 14 by U.S. Reps. Jeff Fortenberry, R-NE, and Debbie Dingell, D-MI, would implement recommendations from the Blue Ribbon Panel, a coalition of business, energy and conservation

leaders assembled by the <u>Association of Fish and Wild-life Agencies</u>. The Blue Ribbon Panel emphasized both the environmental and economic benefits of creating a long-term dedicated funding source to conserve the nation's fish and wildlife.

"Currently there are major gaps in funding to sustain fish and wildlife species and keep them off the emergency list of endangered species," said FWC Chairman Bo Rivard. "These species are important to our nation's heritage and at the heart of how people connect to nature through activities such as boating, bird-watching, camping, fishing, hiking and biking."

The Blue Ribbon Panel recommended dedicating \$1.3 billion annually in existing revenue from the development of energy and mineral resources on federal lands and waters to provide funding to state fish and wildlife agencies to more fully implement well-established and widely supported state wildlife action plans. Under the act, Florida potentially could receive about \$50 million a year to conserve and protect Florida's most vulnerable species and their habitats through Florida's Wildlife Legacy Initiative and State Wildlife Action Plan.

"For decades, wildlife conservation in the U.S. has largely depended on the unique and highly successful system where hunters and anglers willingly provide most of the funding for wildlife conservation work," said FWC Executive Director Eric Sutton. "But we



need to do more, and the Recovering America's Wildlife Act would provide a sustainable, solution-based answer to funding conservation of fish and wildlife species."

The FWC resolution requests support from Florida's Congressional Delegation for the legislation implementing the Blue Ribbon Panel's recommendations. The resolution also calls for support from Florida's conservation community and other state fish and wildlife agencies.



The <u>Alliance for America's Fish &</u> <u>Wildlife</u> (alliance), a coalition of the partners supporting this initiative, is using the theme "Our Nature. Our Nation. Our Future." to summarize the seriousness of what is at

stake. The alliance is actively working to inform the public about the importance of securing the fish and wildlife conservation funding proposed in the Recovering America's Wildlife Act. According to the alliance, the act's benefits include:


- Funding conservation of over 12,000 species of fish and wildlife and their habitats across the U.S.
- Supporting the outdoor recreational economy, which generates 7.6 million U.S. jobs and over \$124 billion in tax revenue. In Florida, the combined economic impact of fishing, wildlife viewing, boating, hunting and the seafood industry is about \$42.8 billion and over 347,000 jobs.
- Helping families get back to nature and away from cellphones and computer screens. Children now spend an average of 50 hours a week on their electronic devices.

The FWC's <u>Florida's Wildlife Legacy Initiative</u>, which develops Florida's <u>State Wildlife Action Plan</u>, is the well-established, state-based framework for implementing the Restoring America's Wildlife Act in Florida and delivering on the commitment to conserve and restore Florida's fish and wildlife resources. A Few New Year's Resolutions Every Angler Should Try to Achieve in 2018 By Mike Hodge

t's the morning after New Year's Day in North Florida. It's cold, and believe it or not, we could get snow in a few days. Cabin fever, anyone? Given that I may be indoors longer than expected, and it's too cold to fish, it's time to make a list of New Year's resolutions — not just your standard goals of personal edification. How about a few suggestions geared toward the fisherman. Let's call them angling aspirations, so here goes:

Take A Kid Fishing

It doesn't have to be your child. It could a neighbor's. There's nothing more rewarding than taking a youngster out for a day on the water. Need the right rod? TFO's Trout-Panfish series is ideal for small, inexperienced hands.

Besides, mentoring is a good way to spend quality time away from the stress of work and family. With the internet, IPhones and the array of social media, we've created an instant-gratification generation where patience is but pipe dream. Time in the outdoors negates that trend. Nature has no clock.

Although catching fish is not the goal, the process of reading the water and evaluating the conditions provides a number of life lessons. Any venue that a parent or mentor can use to instill these skills is invaluable.

Fish More

Stating the obvious? Yes. But the reality most of us need to fish more. Quit making excuses and get out of the office, away from the computer and make time to get on the water.

It doesn't need to be an elaborate trip. You don't even need to load up the boat or strap down the kayak. A few lunchtime casts at the neighborhood park is better than staying home.



As honey-do lists mount and work responsibilities add up, your angling opportunities will dwindle, but don't wait for the perfect day to fish. Why? Because that day almost never comes.

I used to only fish when the tide and winds aligned perfectly. Those days are rare. Fish when you can. You'll learn more and you'll be happier.

Get Organized

Let's say you have a few minutes of free time, not enough time to fish, but enough to get something done. That's the perfect opportunity to organize your gear. You can sort through your fly vest or tackle box. Straighten up the boat. Maybe charge the battery or flush the motor. Every little bit helps and could prevent a headache when you do finally have time to get out for a day on the water. The smoother that first trip of the year is, the better.

Tie Flies

Tying flies is the best way to beat the winter blues. The same thing could be said for watching ESPN or the Outdoors Channel, but when you tie flies, you have a finished product, something that you can use on the water. A good fishing show can motivate you to fish; tying flies actually helps you because it's part of your gear — just like the rod, reel and line.

There's also the issues of cost and personal satisfaction. Tie your own flies and you'll spend less money and have the sense of pride from catching fish on flies created at your vise.

Practice Makes Perfect

We can all learn to cast farther and more accurately. It doesn't matter if you use spinning gear or a fly rod. Regardless of the gear you use, it pays to put in the work in the offseason. If you can't fish, you always find 10, 20 minutes a few days a week to cast in the yard. Too cold? You can always stay indoors with TFO's <u>Bug</u> Launcher or Accelerator.

I've spent a lot of time in the yard casting, but the truth is, I was usually motivated when trying out a new rod or line. As a result, my progress has been somewhat inconsistent. I need to be more disciplined and stick to a practice plan. We all do.

Nobody can attempt all of these resolutions. We all have non-fishing responsibilities. Try or one or two realistic goals. One or two is better than none. Happy New Year.

ome join FCFFers Saturday, February 3, as we celebrate 2018 by doing something completely different -- a fly-fishing education day and group feast and fest, capped by a spectacular mid-afternoon meal, giveaways, silent auction and raffle – all of it at Bobby Weed's Deep Creek Fish Camp on Deep Creek, north of St. Augustine.

PROGRAM

Leading the education day is Sage Flyrod Ambassador and fly casting great Jon Cave. We'll learn new casts, distance casts, roll casts and more, but also, where to use these casts, how to look for and find fish, rigging, leaders and knots. Jon's books on casting and fly fishing travel are perennial best sellers and his are the longest continuous running saltwater fly fishing schools in the world.

VENUE

Weed's Deep Creek Fish Camp is a little bit of old Florida nestled on several acres of salt marsh just west of Pine Island and within sight of the Intracoastal. The facility and grounds are designed by gold course design great Bobby Weed and his wife, Leslie. It has a large enclosed log building with big kitchens and dining both inside and out. Outside there's plenty of room for casting and smaller clinics. Helping Jon with the instruction will be David Lambert, Dick Michaelson and Gavin Glover – so there will be plenty of instructors for everyone. An extra treat – former FCFF president and life member Jimmy Ricks will provide the catering for the event.

Jimmy has moved to Apalachicola where he is the official caterer for Yamaha Motors and Ranger Boats. He caters for groups of 1000s, literally, and for presidents and staff of some of the biggest names in the fishing industry. Jimmy promises a really special meal for his fellow FCFFers – fresh fried fish, his specialty cheese grits, and much more.

Come hungry. We'll have coffee and donuts on site at 9 a.m. We'll do some casting and learning until 2 p.m. The catered meal, giveaways, raffles and silent auction begins at 2:30. This year we've got rods, reels, lines and much more useful stuff for the fly fisher. The day will wrap up around 4:30 in the afternoon.

WHAT TO BRING

Come prepared to spend the majority of the day outside. Dress appropriately.

Bring a rigged fly rod, which you will use for the casting instruction and competition. Be sure that your fly rod is rigged with a full-length leader.

DIRECTIONS

Deep Creek Lodge is a throw-back to Old Florida. It is a former fishing and hunting lodge located on Tolomato River, west of Pine Island. The lodge is located at the end of Pine Island Road, approximately 2 1/2 miles west of US 1. From US 1 turn east on Pine Island Road . Pine Island Road is approximately 4.25 miles south of CR 210 and 2.5 miles north of International Golf Parkway.

Legendary Guide Steve Huff Headlines Florida Fly Fishing Expo

February 9th and 10th Crystal River Plantation

Crystal River, Florida – The 2018 Florida Fly Fishing Expo in Crystal River on February 9-10 has scheduled legendary Florida Keys guide Steve Huff to show and tell some of his secrets for catching giant permit, tarpon, snook and other trophy gamefish on a fly rod.


Huff, who has been described as "the top fly fishing guide on the planet," tops a schedule of more than 20 expert-led seminars and

new fly fishing product displays at Plantation on Crystal River on Florida's west coast. Admission to the twoday expo is \$25 but free for those 12 and younger when accompanied by an adult.

The Florida Fly Fishing Expo is put on annually by the Florida Council of Fly Fishers International. President Tom Gadacz said, "We are so pleased to have Steve Huff coming to the Expo. This guy has a bank-vault of knowledge about catching big fish on the fly and he'll share some hard-earned insights."

After earning a marine biology degree at the University of Miami in 1968 Huff started guiding in the Florida Keys. He pioneered fly fishing for tarpon, permit and snook in the Keys and also led clients to IGFA record tarpon near Crystal River and Homosassa. Sandy Moret, his good friend and a fellow fly fisher, once described Huff as "without question, the top fly fishing guide on the planet."

On Friday, Feb. 9, Huff will present a tutorial about how to locate and catch permit on the fly. On Saturday he will discuss the importance of and how to make



quick fly casts in all directions. As the featured speaker at the Expo's closing banquet on Saturday Huff will share insights he has learned from 50-years of guiding fly fishers to saltwater trophy gamefish.

More than 20 other sessions about how-to fly fish, fly cast and tie flies are scheduled indoors and outdoors at the spacious, waterfront resort of Plantation on Crystal River. They include:





Construction of the fort began in 1847, two years after Florida became a State. Despite its strategic location, this fort never saw any bloodshed. Today, it is part of Florida's park system. The park opens at 8 am to visitors, and there is a \$2 entrance fee. The park entrance is located at 2601 Atlantic Avenue in Fernandina Beach.

The plan is fish the incoming tide, which will be at 4:48 PM. For those so inclined, you can reserve a camp site at the park for a tent or RV. If you prefer to sleep in your own bed, we will be meeting at Blackfly Outfitters on Beach Boulevard in Jacksonville at 11 AM. You can pick up any last minute supplies before we caravan to the Fort. We will plan to meet in the Fort parking lot at 12:30 PM.

Boats

This is a great outing for both wade fishing and boats. Wade fishing is available from the shoreline at the northwest side of the fort. If you rperfer to fish out of a boat, you can put in at the North End/Dee Dee Bartles boat ramp on the west side of the park. Please note that the boat ramp is not part of the state park.

Flies and Equipment


