


January Meeting Monday January 7, 2013 at 7 PM

Bill is an IGFA Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame World Record Holder for Muskie and Walleye on the fly. He has published fly



Bill has been a full time guide for over 20 years. He holds line class world records for Walleye, Smallmouth Bass, Speckled Sea Trout, and Muskie on the fly. Additionally, he hold the All Tackle World Record, Florida State Record and Line Class World Record for Gafftop Sail Cat.

Bill is the owner of We Tie It Fly Shop, which serves northern Wisconsin and Michigan's Upper Peninsula. The shop is located in Boulder Junction, "The Muskie Capital of the World." He is the largest Cortland Pro-Shop in the Midwest and offers the most complete selection of fly tying materials in the Northwoods.

FCFF 2013 Board of Directors



previously served on the Board as Secretary. He counts last year's outing to Stuart in July as one of the best fly fishing experiences of his life.


MEMBERSHIP CHAIRMAN - SCOTT SHOBER




President's Message

He is a USCG licensed Captain and a Federation of Fly Fishers Certified Casting Instructor.

BIG DAY FOR A LITTLE FISH

ASMFC takes first step to finally bring menhaden under management

BALTIMORE, MD – For the first time ever, the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) will reduce the harvest of menhaden and finally begin the process of managing this critical forage base. The measure approved today by the Menhaden Management Board will reduce menhaden harvest in both the reduction and bait fisheries by 20 percent beginning in 2013.

"Coastal Conservation Association has been fighting this fight for 20 years as Atlantic menhaden have always been one of the most important species in the ocean to anglers," said Richen Brame, Atlantic States fisheries director for CCA "The action taken today is an historical victory for recreational anglers, conservation-minded citizens and the most important fish in the sea – menhaden. For the first time ever, the Atlantic menhaden fishery is finally being managed. The key in today's action is that the ASMFC made a decision to manage menhaden as part of an ecosystem rather than solely as a food fish. This philosophy is a major step forward for improving the marine ecosystem for anglers from Maine to Florida."


The 20 percent reduction is far less than many recreational anglers would have preferred, but even that reduction in harvest was in doubt as Omega Protein, the only remaining company engaged in the menhaden reduction industry, brought enormous political pressure to bear on the management process.

"We would have liked to see a greater reduction to ensure the health of the stock, but it is important to keep an eye on the larger picture," said Brame. "Throughout its history, menhaden were managed by a process dominated by industry solely for its own use and profit. Today's action marks a sea-change in how this fishery is perceived and how it will be managed going forward. That is the real victory. Our work is not done, but we finally have the arena to manage menhaden for what it is – a critical forage base. Hopefully, this clears the way for further reductions in harvest."

The latest menhaden stock assessment showed the stock was undergoing overfishing and abundance estimates were at the lowest level ever recorded. Current science indicates that the menhaden spawning stock biomass is at about 9 percent of a stock that is not subjected to any fishing pressure. The 20 percent reduction in harvest is an interim measure that will be in place until the results of the next benchmark stock assessment are known in 2014.

"The Board took interim steps today to protect this important stock while we await better scientific advice from a new stock assessment," said Brame. "The picture is constantly evolving, and we appreciate that the Menhaden Management Board took steps now to finally begin rebuilding menhaden."

He is author of 'Fisherman's Coast', wrote four chapters for Chico Fernandez's 'Fly-Fishing for Bonefish', has written numerous articles for fly fishing magazines, and has given many seminars on fish ecology for anglers in numerous venues. He is also



an avid fly angler.

Simple Shad Dart

<u>Editors Note:</u> In another month, the Shad will be making their way up the St. Johns River. Now is the time to get ready and tie up a mess of flies. So, we turn to the December 2012 issue of the On the Fly newsletter of the Suncoast Fly Fishers for the month's tying feature.

his is my go-to fly for the St Johns River shad run. Creativity is key; use a variety of colors and weights. I'll often have the same pattern with bead chain and dumb-bell eyes. Remember to keep your patterns relatively small; size 6 and 8 are best. I'll also have a few in sizes 4 and 10. Some of my favorite colors to include are: chartreuse, pink, pearl, silver, yellow and red. A variety of patterns will work but most are based around several basic patterns such as the Wooly Bugger, Clouser Minnow, Gotcha and Crazy Charlie.

Materials

Hook: Mustad 3366 Sizes 4 to 8

Thread: 140 Denier Flat Waxed

Tail: Pearl Flashabou

Body: Vinyl Ribbing

Eyes: Silver Bead Chain

Head: Antron Dubbing or Uni-Yarn


Tying Instructions

- 1. Start a layer of thread fro the hook eye to the start of the bend.
- 2. Tie in your Flashabou tail. Remember to keep it short as the Shat will nip the longer tails.
- 3. Tie the bead chain or dumb-bell eyes behind the eye of the hook and remember to give yourself some space for the head.
- 4. Tie in the vinyl ribbing behind the eyes and wind it all the way down the shank to the tail. Mover your thread back towards the eye. Wrap the vinyl rib all the way up to the eyes and tie it off.
- 5. Tie in a piece of Uni-Yarn to wrap around the eyes to form a dubbed head. You can also use any other type of shaggy dubbing to get the same effect.
- 6. Whip finish behind the eye of the hook.

Survey Shows Outdoor Recreation is Important to Florida's Residents and Visitors.

TALLAHASSEE - The Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) Florida Park Service today announced the results of the 2011 Florida Outdoor Recreation Participation Survey. The study, which measured the satisfaction of Florida's residents and visitors with current recreation opportunities in Florida and determined levels of participation for outdoor recreation activities, found that outdoor recreation is important to 98 percent of tourists and 96 percent of residents.

"This study is a great tool for Florida's outdoor recreation providers, and will help us ensure that we are in tune with the recreational needs of the state's citizens and visitors," said DEP's Florida Park Service Director

Donald V. Forgone. "Outdoor recreation is not only a major contributor to Florida's economy, but also educates and cultivates the next generation of envi-



ronmental stewards."

Responsive Management, a survey research firm specializing in natural resource and outdoor recreation issues, surveyed nearly 4,000 Florida residents and nearly 3,000 tourists between April and October 2011 by telephone. Of the tourists surveyed, 97 percent said they were satisfied with the outdoor recreation opportunities in Florida, including 77 percent who are very satisfied. The majority of Florida residents (80 percent) are satisfied with the outdoor recreation opportunities in their county.

Nearly all participants (99 percent of residents and 96 percent of tourists) noted that spending time with family and friends is an important factor for participating in outdoor recreation.

Saltwater beach activities were the most popular among all participants—63 percent of residents and 49 percent of visitors enjoyed this activity in the past 12 months. The next most popular activity among Florida residents was wildlife viewing, which 49 percent enjoyed in the last year. Forty-six percent went fishing, 44 percent enjoyed bicycling and 40 percent enjoyed a picnic outdoors in the last year. Forty-seven percent of tourists enjoyed wildlife viewing last year, followed by 37 percent who enjoyed picnicking, 29 percent of visitors who went swimming in public outdoor pools and 26 percent of tourists who visited historical or archaeological sites.

The Florida Park Service is not only one of Florida's leading outdoor recreation providers with 160 state parks, the Marjorie Harris Carr Cross Florida Greenway and eight state trails, but is also responsible for developing and executing a comprehensive outdoor recreation plan, in cooperation with other public recreation land managers, including and state and local recreation providers. This survey will be used to evaluate the supply, demand and need for outdoor recreation for the 2013 update of the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP).

By contributing to the quality of life for residents and the state's desirability as a tourist destination, outdoor recreation in Florida stimulates the economy and creates jobs. Florida's outdoor recreation program provides a diverse system of resources, facilities and programs. The 2011 Outdoor Recreation Participation Survey confirms that outdoor recreation opportunities are very important to Florida's residents and tourists. View the complete survey HERE.
