

If you are new to fly tying, this is a great time to learn. If you have been tying for years, why not learn a couple new patterns to add to your arsenal?

The internet is a great source of fly tying videos. Some videos are professionally made; others not so much. The biggest problem you are going to have is wading through all the videos to pick out the gems. The crack

## The Clouser Minnow

According to Lefty Kreh, the Clouser Deep Minnow has caught more species of fish than any other fly. This fly should be part of both your fresh water and salt water fly boxes. It is a relatively easy fly to tie and one that beginning fly tyers usually master in a short amount of time. Learn how to tie the fly from Bob Clouser himself. ## Woolly Bugger

The Woolly Bugger is a simple tie. Most beginner fly tying classes start with tying this fly. It is an effective fresh water pattern that can also be adapted to salt water. Longtime Orvis Instructor Tom Rosenbauer has been doing regular tying classes through Facebook Live. He provides a little history on the pattern before demonstrating how to tie the fly. ## Borski Slider

Tom Borski is an innovative fly tyer and artist from the Keys. His patterns are famous for relying exclusively on natural tying materials. One of his well known patterns is the Borski Slider, a baitfish pattern that works great in shallow water for redfish. This pattern requires spinning deer hair to form the head. If you are new to spinning deer hair it might take a couple tries to get the hang of it. The nice thing about this pattern is that it doesn't have to be perfect.

## Lefty's Deceiver

Lefty's Deceiver is another pattern that can lay claim to catching numerous species of fish. In fact the patten is so good, the US Post Office gave it it's own stamp. In this video, Lefty demonstrates how to tie his fly. Similar to Clouser's minnow, Lefty's Deceiver is an easy fly to tie and has been credited with numerous species of fish. 
# Florida Boat Ramp Finder

Before you load up the trailer and head to the water, it is nice to know which boat ramps are open and which are not. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission maintains a new web that identifies and tracks the status of boat launches and ramps around the state. The web-based map is a compendium of most state, local and commercial ramps, launches and marinas.

In addition to identifying the operational status of the ramps, the map provides such information as:

- Primary agency/owner
- Fee amount
- Hours of operation
- Type of ramp surface
- Number of ramps
- Number of parking spaces
- Availability of restroom facilities
- Street address
- GPS Coordinates



# Dumb Luck and the Kindness of Strangers

By John Gierach

**W**itty, shrewd, and, as always, a joy to read, John Gierach, “America’s best fishing writer” (Houston Chronicle) and favorite streamside philosopher, extols the frequent joys and occasional tribulations of the fly-fishing life.



“After five decades, twenty books, and countless columns, [John Gierach] is still a master” (Forbes). Now, in his latest fresh and original collection, Gierach shows us why fly-fishing is the perfect antidote to everything that is wrong with the world.

“Gierach’s deceptively laconic prose masks an accomplished storyteller...His alert and slightly off-kilter observations place him in the general neighborhood of Mark Twain and James Thurber” (Publishers Weekly). In *Dumb Luck and the Kindness of Strangers*, Gierach looks back to the long-ago day when he bought his first resident fishing license in Colorado, where the fishing season never ends, and just knew he was in the right place. And he succinctly sums up part of the appeal of his sport when he writes that it is “an acquired taste that reintroduces the chaos of uncertainty back into our well-regulated lives.”

Lifelong fisherman though he is, Gierach can write with self-deprecating humor about his own fishing misadventures, confessing that despite all his experience, he is still capable of blowing a strike by a fish “in the usual amateur way.” The “voice of the common angler” (The Wall Street Journal), he offers witty, trenchant observations not just about fly-fishing itself but also about how one’s love of fly-fishing shapes the world that we choose to make for ourselves.

*Dumb Luck and the Kindness of Strangers* is scheduled to be published by Simon and Shuster on June 2, 2020. The list price is \$27.00

# PIPER'S PANDEMIC PLUGS

**A**lways creative, Captain Lawrence Piper is using his downtime during the pandemic to hand craft fishing plugs. According to Captain Piper, I've always admired and collected antique fishing lures and also new ones that are handmade. I decided to try my hand at it. These are made out of Cedar, Cypress, and Heart Pine lumber that I had laying around. The first few were hand painted, using masking tape and spray cans. #LP008 was the first one painted with an airbrush. #LP007 was a complete screw up - mixing incompatible paints - so I sanded it and left it weathered, but it actually looks pretty good).

I've found out that the forming, carving and sanding is actually easier than I thought (thank goodness for power tools), but the painting and finishing is proving to be the most difficult. I learn something on each lure so hopefully by the time I get to #50 they'll look perfect!

If you are interested in picking up one of these unique, hand crafted plugs they range from \$25 to \$30 a piece (plus tax and shipping) and come with their own wooden stand. 



# Florida: No Red Tide Fish Kills or Respiratory Irritation on Florida Beaches

The red tide organism, *Karenia brevis*, was observed in one sample collected from Southwest Florida over the past week. Additional details are provided below. Please note: We are continuing to process samples, but are experiencing a reduction in sampling by FWRI staff and partners due to COVID-19 concerns.

- In **Southwest Florida** over the past week, *K. brevis* was observed at very low concentrations in one sample collected offshore of Monroe County.
- In **Northwest Florida** over the past week, *K. brevis* was not observed.
- Along the **Florida East Coast** over the past week, *K. brevis* was not observed.

No **fish kills** suspected to be related to red tide were reported over the past week (please see <https://myfwc.com/research/saltwater/health/fish-kills-hotline>).

No reports of **respiratory irritation** were received over the past month.

**Forecasts** by the [USF-FWC Collaboration for Prediction of Red Tides](#) for Pinellas to northern Monroe counties predict variable transport of surface waters with net northern movement, and net southeastern movement of subsurface waters in most areas over the next four days. The next complete status report will be issued on Friday, April 3rd. Please check our [daily sampling map](#), which can be accessed via the online status report on our [Red Tide Current Status](#) page. For more information on algal blooms and water quality, please visit [Protecting Florida Together](#).

This information, including maps and reports with additional details, is also available on the [FWRI Red Tide website](#). The website also provides links to [additional information](#) related to the topic of Florida red tide including satellite imagery, experimental red tide forecasts, shellfish harvesting areas, the FWC Fish Kill Hotline, the Florida Poison Information Center (to re-

port human health effects related to exposure to red tide), and other wildlife related hotlines.


